

## Luna E Gnac Di Italo Calvino Uncommons

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this book addresses a central concern in the work of Italy's most important contemporary novelist Italo Calvino: it investigates the relationship between the visual and the textual in Italo

calvino s oeuvre a key aspect of the author s multidimensional writings

this groundbreaking new source of international scope defines the essay as nonfictional prose texts of between one and 50 pages in length the more than 500 entries by 275 contributors include entries on nationalities various categories of essays such as generic such as sermons aphorisms individual major works notable writers and periodicals that created a market for essays and particularly famous or significant essays the preface details the historical development of the essay and the alphabetically arranged entries usually include biographical sketch nationality era selected writings list additional readings and anthologies

although never named as such the landscape of sanremo was a visual source for calvino s fiction this recurring theme provides both a link between some very different works and an insight into the autobiographical dimension of an author whose attitude to privacy is protective but detached this work is an analysis of the criteria of representative and of representational distortion of a descriptive motif

in the half century following pavese s death much that was written about him sought principally to understand and define his complex character and to determine his place within the twentieth century italian literary canon latterly there appears to have been a significant shift in focus towards a closer reading of individual works or aspects or periods of his writing the better to analyse and reveal the subtleties and depth of his vision this present collection of ten essays conforms broadly with this tendency it is organised chronologically with regard to pavese s life and works so as to convey a sense of the development of a writer over and above the particular concerns of any given essay the book features contributions from many leading experts on pavese

this study recovers italo calvino s central place in a lost history of interdisciplinary thought politics and literary philosophy in the 1960s drawing on his letters essays critical reviews and fiction as well as a wide range of works primarily urban planning and design theory and history circulating among his primary interlocutors this book takes as its point of departure a sweeping reinterpretation of invisible cities passages from calvino s most famous novel routinely appear as aphorisms in calendars posters and the popular literature of inspiration

and self help reducing the novel to vague abstractions and totalizing wisdom about thinking outside the box the shadow of postmodern studies has had a similarly diminishing effect on this text rendering up an accomplished but ultimately apolitical novelistic experimentation in endless deconstructive deferrals the shiny surfaces of play and the ultimately rigged game of self referentiality in contrast this study draws on an archive of untranslated italian and french language materials on urban planning architecture and utopian architecture to argue that calvino s novel in fact introduces readers to the material history of urban renewal in italy france and the u s in the 1960s as well as the multidisciplinary core of cultural life in that decade the complex and continuous interplay among novelists and architects scientists and artists literary historians and visual studies scholars his last love poem for the dying city was in fact profoundly engaged deeply committed to the ethical dimensions of both architecture and lived experience in the spaces of modernity as well as the resistant practices of reading and utopian imagining that his urban studies in turn inspired

critical interest in biography and autobiography has never been higher however while life writing flourishes in the uk in italy it is a less prominent genre the twelve essays collected here are written against this backdrop and address issues in biographical and autobiographical writing in italy from the later nineteenth century to the present with a particular emphasis on the interplay between individual lives and life writing and the wider social and political history of italy the majority of essays focus on well known writers d annunzio svevo bontempelli montale levi calvino eco and fallaci and their varying anxieties about autobiographical writing in their work this picture is rounded out by a series of studies of similar themes in lesser known figures the critic enrico nencioni the welsh italian painter llewellyn lloyd and italian writers and journalists covering the spanish civil war the contributors all specialists in their fields are antonella braida charles burdett jane everson john gatt rutter robert gordon gwyn griffith peter hainsworth martin mclaughlin gianni oliva giuliana pieri and jon usher the volume is dedicated to john woodhouse on his seventieth birthday and concludes with a bibliography of his writings

throughout the novels and stories the cosmicomical tales with their focus on science are seen as crucial to the development of the symbolic mindscapes that made calvino a major international writer he died before arriving at any satisfactory solution to the problems of relating the i to the not i but hume derives from his later works a philosophy based on the creation of likenesses of internal microcosms that permit us to mirror the macrocosm these interior

essays on italian novelists poets and playwrights new forms of expression through experimentation as well as avant garde groups including young and idealistic literati that called themselves gruppo 63 and later gruppo 93 covers feminist writers the inauguration of the postmodern narratives often called metafiction and the new novel

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
